## BICENTENNIAL OF PANAMA'S INDEPENDENCE



The EU-LAC Foundation and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Panama organised a seminar entitled "Past and Future: Panama in the historical reference of multilateralism", which took place virtually on 26 November 2021 in the framework of the commemoration of the Bicentennial of the Independence of Hispanic America.

The event was opened with remarks by the Executive Director of the EU-LAC International Foundation, **Dr Adrián Bonilla**, and the Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Panama, **Ms Erika Mouynes.** Minister Erika Mouynes highlighted the strong and close link between Europe and Latin America, two regions that share a vocation for integration and partnership often amended in response to the liberating intention of preserving the peace that has been achieved.

Three renowned lecturers and experts on Latin Americanism, Natalia Sobrevilla from Peru, Salvador Sánchez from Panama and Joshua Simon from the United States of America, joined a long-running debate on the constitutionalist initiatives of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, their influence on the formation of American nations and the historical role of Panama, a country determined socio-politically by its geographical location.

The event ended with the closing remarks made by the Ambassador of Panama in Brussels H.E. Yavel Francis Lanuza, who thanked the speakers for introduce the republican experiences and democratic processes of our nations, on the occasion of the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of independence.

The Ambassador took the opportunity to highlight that our region urges for a new paradigm of development and transformations. The strengthening of multilateral, regional and bilateral relations, are more necessary than ever, especially in the post-pandemic recovery process, to better build back together. # ONE OF THE MOST CONNECTED COUNTRIES IN THE WORLD

Panama City's Tocumen International Airport jumped in the list of the world's top ten airports hubs, moving from 20th place in 2019 to seventh place in 2021. In this way, it continues as the Latin American airport with the highest proportion of international connections globally, according to Forward Keys data.

In 2019, Tocumen handled 1.2% of international connections. After a 2020 without ranking due to the impact of the pandemic, the 2021 data show that this figure became 3.5%, which explains the jump in the list and its inclusion in the top 10 worldwide.

Of all passengers passing through Tocumen, most of them (45%) come from South America. This is followed by North America with 32.1%, Central America with 9.8%, the Caribbean with 8.5% and Europe with 4.6%, reported Bloomberg.

The airport moved almost 8 million passengers (7,967,142) between January and November 2021. Most of them made connections and did not have Panama as their final destination.

"Panama has recovered 85% of its prepandemic connectivity to North America and Europe, as well as its intra-regional traffic, surpassing countries that never closed their skies, such as the United States and Brazil," said the International Air Transport Association (IATA).





### **PRESIDENCY PRO TEMPORE OF SICA**

The Republic of Panama assumed for the next six months, the Presidency Pro Tempore of the Central American Integration System (SICA), which has been promoting regional cooperation in an intersectoral manner for 30 years.

Upon receiving the mandate, on behalf of President Laurentino Cortizo Cohen, Foreign Minister of Panama - Erika Mouynes declared before the representatives of the Member States Panama's commitment to a robust and strengthened SICA that is up to the complexity of the times we live in.

"Panama undertakes the commitment to respect the expression of will of what the Member States think and want, with the utmost desire that the interests of all are adequately represented and executed for the benefit of the entire Central American Integration System, following up on the work of regional cooperation, inclusion, gender equity, the Central American security strategy, among other issues, within the framework of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development," said the head of Panamanian diplomacy during the change of command ceremony, which was held virtually.



According to the Panamanian minister, President Cortizo's administration will continue with the implementation of Central American mandates on institutional strengthening, in order to contribute to the construction of a wellconsidered and consensual regional agenda that continues the analysis of the Institutional Universe to advance in the reorganization of SICA. In addition, during its presidency, Panama will coordinate the efforts of the SICA Council of Ministers to jointly support, at the national and regional levels, the fight against the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. From the Pro Tempore Presidency, Panama promotes regional integration from five priority pillars, namely: Integration, Democratic Social Security, Institutional Strengthening, Climate Change and Comprehensive Risk Management and Economic Integration.

## THE ALLIANCE FOR DEVELOPMENT IN DEMOCRACY



A dramatic rise in migrants, the crisis in Haiti, the pandemic's impact and democracy backsliding have united three countries in the Caribbean and Central America in the search for quick solutions. An alliance between Panama, Costa Rica and the Dominican Republic to coordinate their foreign policy hopes to promote economic recovery, find multilateral solutions to the migration crisis and strengthen democratic institutions to counteract the decline of basic freedoms in the region, the Foreign Minister of Panama, Erika Mouynes, said in an interview with el Nuevo Herald and the Miami Herald. The Alliance for Development in Democracy, an initiative that took off on the sidelines of the United Nations General Assembly last year, was created in response to "recent regional developments, some of which are very worrying concerning democracy," Mouynes said. The participant countries shared common ground on several foreign policies issues, she added.

The Alliance has held several meetings to coordinate a response to the situation in Haiti due to its impact on the migration crisis. The minister said that Panama had seen the number of irregular migrants arriving from Colombia en route to the United States jump from 8,000 in 2020 to more than 130,000 last year. Many come from Haiti, she added. "The migration problem is not going to be solved by any single country," she said. "You have to involve partners that have a marked interest such as Canada, the United States and Mexico," and the Alliance serves to "bring them to the table." President Joe Biden called the Alliance "inspiring" in his closing speech at the Summit for Democracy in December.

## COIBA NATIONAL PARK GAINS BLUE SPARK STATUS



During its 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Ocean Gala, the Marine Conservation Institute awarded Panama's Coiba National Park Blue Spark status. The title is given to governments, managers, and communities to recognize outstanding marine protected areas and incentivize effective conservation around the world. Panama has committed its Coiba park to reach the Blue Park standard, which is the Marine Conservation Institute's highest level of protection.

"For Panama, it is an honor that Coiba National Park is now a Blue Spark, on the path to becoming a Blue Park, reaffirming Panama's commitment to ensure the conservation of coastal marine resources," said Shirley Binder, Director of Protected Areas and Biodiversity in Panama's Ministry of Environment, during the gala.

"Coiba National Park is one of the largest and most important marine parks in Panama, with the largest island in the Mesoamerican pacific, Coiba Island, with 38 other smaller islands and islets, surrounded by high marine biodiversity," she added.

As a nation bordered by the Atlantic and Pacific, Panama has always understood its unique responsibility to safeguard the waters along its borders. Its work to protect the Coiba National Park is just part of a larger effort to keep its marine ecosystems clean – Panama has designated five special marine-coastal resource management zones and more than 46 marine protected areas.

Panama's leadership in this space extends beyond domestic actions – Panama was proud to partner with Ecuador, Colombia, and Costa Rica at COP26 to announce the protection of the Eastern Tropical Pacific Marine Corridor, combining national marine protected areas to create one of the world's largest and most biodiverse protected marine areas.

# CHAMPION FOR DEMOCRACY & GOVERNANCE



The Adrienne Arsht Latin America Center launched a network of regional champions that have demonstrated exceptional leadership in Latin America and the Caribbean promoting solutions for the four main pillars of the Summit of the Americas: democracy and governance; pandemic and disaster preparedness; equitable and green economic recovery; and digitalization to grow the middle class. This distinguished cohort leads a campaign to promote prosperity, stability, and cooperation in the Americas, bringing greater recognition to the importance of the Summit of the Americas for all citizens. Latin America Center appointed H.E Erika Mouynes, Panama's Minister of Foreign Affairs as Champion for Democracy thanks to her leadership in vaccine access, climate diplomacy, and environmental conservation. Panama continues to set an example for other countries in the region.

# "GRETA THUNBERG", THE NEW SPECIES OF FROG DISCOVERED IN PANAMA

An international team led by biologists from Panama and Swiss discovered a new species of frog in a Panamanian cloud forest that was named "Greta Thunberg", in honor of the young Swedish activist and her efforts in the face of the climate crisis.

The frog of Greta Thunberg (Pristimantis gretathunbergae sp. Nov.) Belongs to the group of rain frogs (rainfrogs) of the genus Pristimantis, Family Strabomantidae, said the biologist and director of the ADOPTA Bosque Association, Guido Berguido.

The article in which the new species is described and officially named It was published in Pensoft's scientific journal ZooKeys. The specimen was discovered by an international team of biologists led by doctors Abel Batista, from Panama, and Konrad Mebert (Switzerland) at Cerro Chucantí, a private reserve located in the Darien province and managed by **ADOPT Forest**.

The new species of frog **"is endemic to Panama,** it is only reported in the Republic of Panama and it only lives in the high mountains of Darien and in the Center of Panama. In other words, it has a very restricted habitat and therefore is vulnerable to extinction", explained Berguido.

The amphibian has black eyes, a unique trait among Central American rain frogs, and its closest relatives inhabit northwestern Colombia. Ministry of the Environment of Panama and the Association ADOPT Forest.
